Take inspiration from design in history.


Combine elements from a range of inspirational designers throughout history.

### Vocabulary

Pattern and template	A shape made of metal, plastic or paper which is used to make copies or to help someone cut something accurately.
Thread	A long piece of cotton, wool or nylon used for sewing.
Seam allowance	The area between the edge and the stitching line on two pieces of material being stitched together.
Applique	Decoration in which pieces of fabric are sewn or stuck on to a larger piece to form a picture or pattern.
Finishing	Finishing the seam is done to the cut edge of the seam to prevent it from unravelling.
Stitch	A single turn or loop of thread or yarn. It is used to connect pieces of fabric together.
Design	A plan or drawing produced to show the look and function of an object before it is made.
Recycling	Taking used material and reusing it for something else to avoid waste.







Here are some materials and equipment that you might need: plastic strips cut from old folders, scissors, recycled paper, ruler, recycled fabric, needle, pins and thread.

## Focus

Recycling occurs when you save and take reusable materials to places where they can be remade into either the same product or new products, rather than to just toss them away.
