We need your green fingers please...

We have been trying to secure funding for our forest school through a variety of ways and our wonderful PTA have been supporting us, however we do have a long way to go. We have managed to remove excess trees and get the storage container moved to maximise ground space. We now need to re-establish the pond; clear out rubbish and create vegetable patches and flower beds; build insect hotels and a pen for chickens; dig fire pits to roast marsh mellows and create a nature trail. We would also like at some point to have a secure area for a bee hive so we can produce Hurst Hill Honey for the children as well as planting fruit trees. Research has shown that children flourish when learning outside and we want to ensure that all pupils benefit from wider experiences as well as understanding sustainability.

If you are interested in being part of this project, I will be opening up the forest school area for parents and relatives on Wednesday 8th January between 9 and 10 am. This will allow you to view the area and gain greater insight of the project - participants would then be able to discuss how they might support and help us create a plan of action. We realise this is a big ambitious project, but hopefully with community support, we can accomplish wonders.

It's been another action packed week for children at Hurst Hill. Our playground buddies have begun their super role and proudly wear their new Buddy Jackets; the 'Year 5 Inspire Session' was a huge success with a fantastic turn out from parents once again and year one had a visit from a tortoise - they were so excited. David Brown - a local minister who delivers assemblies across many schools -joined us on Wednesday. He was full of praise for Hurst Hill and commented on how wonderfully well behaved the children were. They were confident and respectful during the assembly contributions. We are indeed very proud of the behaviour at Hurst Hill, we do have high standards and expectations and this in turn encourages pupils to be the best version of themselves.

In school we guide and support children to make the correct decisions, we advise them on how to use social media safely with kindness at the forefront. This week we had to speak to pupils who were being unkind on WHATS APP whilst at home. We had to address this as it was impacting on pupil's ability to learn—some pupils were anxious about influencers and words that had been exchanged between groups. I would like to ask parents to support me in emphasising that group chats should not be used as a platform to ridicule others. Nor should it be used as a voting platform to encourage others to behave in a negative way. The laws around unkindness and bullying online are clearly displayed on our website and we will work with authorities to tackle any inappropriate online behaviour that takes place at home if it impacts on the learning of pupils. If you would like extra support regarding screen time and negative behaviour, then please speak to the school office and Mr Johnson will arrange a time to meet with you.


